**A BILL**

To provide, manufacture, and distribute high quality face masks for every individual in the United States during the COVID–19 emergency using the Defense Production Act and other means.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Masks for All Act of  
5 2020”.

1 **SEC. 2. REQUIREMENT TO ELIMINATE MASK SHORTAGES.**

2 The President, acting through the Administrator,  
3 shall, as soon as practicable—

4 (1) eliminate all shortages of face masks, sur-  
5 gical masks, and N-95 respirator masks in the  
6 United States; and

7 (2) distribute the masks described in paragraph  
8 (1) to the general public and the health care work-  
9 force in accordance with this Act.

10 **SEC. 3. PROVIDING HIGH QUALITY FACE MASKS TO EVERY**  
11 **INDIVIDUAL IN THE UNITED STATES.**

12 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 30 days after the  
13 date of enactment of this Act, the Administrator shall es-  
14 tablish a program to provide a supply of 3 high quality,  
15 reusable face masks to every individual in the United  
16 States, including individuals—

17 (1) experiencing homelessness; and

18 (2) living in group quarters, as defined by the  
19 Census Bureau for the purposes of the most recent  
20 decennial census.

21 (b) NO COST TO INDIVIDUALS.—An individual that  
22 receives a supply of face masks under this section shall  
23 not be charged for the face masks, for the delivery of the  
24 face masks, or for any other administrative cost related  
25 to the face masks.

1 (c) PROHIBITION ON IDENTIFICATION REQUIRE-  
2 MENT.—An individual that receives a supply of face masks  
3 under this section shall not be required to provide identi-  
4 fication or proof of citizenship in order to receive the face  
5 masks.

6 (d) DELIVERIES.—To the greatest extent possible,  
7 face masks under this section shall be delivered using the  
8 United States Postal Service.

9 (e) EDUCATIONAL MATERIALS.—

10 (1) IN GENERAL.—Face masks provided under  
11 this section shall be accompanied by a 1 page fact  
12 sheet on the importance of wearing face masks, the  
13 proper use of face masks, and the nearest face mask  
14 pickup sites designated under subsection (f).

15 (2) REQUIREMENTS.—The information included  
16 in the fact sheet required under paragraph (1) shall  
17 be—

18 (A) scientifically and medically accurate;

19 (B) written for a layperson;

20 (C) presented in a size and type of font  
21 that is easy to read; and

22 (D) provided in the languages that are  
23 most appropriate for the community.

24 (3) PUBLICATION OF INFORMATION.—The in-  
25 formation included in the fact sheet required under

1 paragraph (1) shall be published on the public  
2 website of the Federal Emergency Management  
3 Agency and the Department of Health and Human  
4 Services in multiple languages and in a manner that  
5 is in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities  
6 Act of 1990 for reading by the visually impaired.

7 (f) FACE MASK PICKUP SITES.—

8 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Administrator shall des-  
9 ignate face mask pickup sites in each community  
10 and shall provide face masks to each site, allocated  
11 according to population, to be distributed to the gen-  
12 eral public at no cost to the public.

13 (2) REQUIREMENTS FOR DESIGNATION OF  
14 SITES.—In designating sites as face mask pickup  
15 sites under paragraph (1), the Administrator shall  
16 choose—

17 (A) a location of a public entity, organiza-  
18 tion, or business that is providing essential  
19 services to communities, such as a post office,  
20 community pharmacy, Federally-qualified health  
21 center, senior center, congregate meal site, and  
22 COVID–19 testing site;

23 (B) a location that is easily accessible and  
24 appropriate to maximize the public health re-  
25 sponse to COVID–19; and

1 (C) when possible, a location that is Feder-  
2 ally operated or is a recipient of Federal funds.

3 (3) REQUIREMENT FOR PICKUP SITES.—If a  
4 site is designated as a face mask pickup site under  
5 paragraph (1)—

6 (A) no individual shall be required to make  
7 a purchase in order to pick up masks at such  
8 location; and

9 (B) the site shall agree to display informa-  
10 tion, supplied by the Administrator, in a promi-  
11 nent location that—

12 (i) advertises the availability of free  
13 face masks provided by the Federal Gov-  
14 ernment; and

15 (ii) meets the requirements described  
16 in subsection (e)(2).

17 (g) NEW TECHNOLOGY.—

18 (1) IN GENERAL.—For purposes of delivering  
19 and providing the best available masks under this  
20 section, the Administrator shall solicit new designs  
21 to create the most comfortable, well-fitting, and 2-  
22 way face masks that have adjustable sizing.

23 (2) STRATEGIC NATIONAL STOCKPILE.—If sig-  
24 nificant improvements in face mask technology are  
25 made available, the Administrator, in coordination

1 with the Secretary, shall ensure that such face  
2 masks are included in the strategic national stock-  
3 pile.

4 (h) REQUIRED COORDINATION AND CONSULTA-  
5 TION.—

6 (1) COORDINATION.—In carrying out this sec-  
7 tion, the Administrator shall coordinate with the  
8 Secretary, the Assistant Secretary, the Postmaster  
9 General, and the heads of any other appropriate  
10 Federal departments or agencies.

11 (2) CONSULTATION.—In carrying out this sec-  
12 tion, the Administrator shall consult with States,  
13 units of local government, pickup sites, and appro-  
14 priate labor unions, including labor organizations  
15 representing employees of the United States Postal  
16 Service.

17 (i) EFFECT ON REQUESTS FOR PERSONAL PROTEC-  
18 TIVE EQUIPMENT.—Any face masks provided under this  
19 section shall not be taken into account for purposes of the  
20 Federal Government responding to State or health care  
21 provider requests for surgical masks, N-95 respirator  
22 masks, personal protective equipment, or other supplies  
23 related to COVID-19.

1 **SEC. 4. HEALTH CARE WORKFORCE.**

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 30 days after the  
3 date of enactment of this Act, the Administrator shall pro-  
4 vide surgical masks and N–95 respirator masks to all indi-  
5 viduals working in health care settings in the United  
6 States that are experiencing a shortage of such masks, in-  
7 cluding settings that have a short-term supply of such  
8 masks and settings that are practicing extended use and  
9 re-use of such masks.

10 (b) NO COST TO PERSONS OR STATES.—A person or  
11 State that receives surgical masks and N–95 respirator  
12 masks under this section shall not be charged for the face  
13 masks, for the delivery of the face masks, or for any other  
14 administrative cost related to the face masks.

15 (c) REQUIRED COORDINATION.—In carrying out this  
16 section, the Administrator shall coordinate—

17 (1) with the Secretary, the Assistant Secretary,  
18 the Postmaster General, and the heads of any other  
19 appropriate Federal departments or agencies; and

20 (2) to the greatest extent practicable, with  
21 other Federal programs that provide masks or other  
22 personal protective equipment to individuals working  
23 in health care settings.

24 (d) REQUIRED CONSULTATION.— In carrying out  
25 this section, the Administrator shall consult with health  
26 care providers and labor organizations representing health

1 professionals and other individuals working in health care  
2 settings.

3 **SEC. 5. USE OF AUTHORITIES.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—In carrying out this Act, the  
5 President shall make use of any and all available authori-  
6 ties at the disposal of the Federal Government to procure,  
7 domestically manufacture, support the domestic manufac-  
8 turing of face masks, and distribute face masks, surgical  
9 masks, and N-95 respirator masks, including emergency  
10 authorities, such as the Defense Production Act of 1950  
11 (50 U.S.C. 4511 et seq.), the National Emergencies Act  
12 (50 U.S.C. 1601 et seq.), and the Robert T. Stafford Dis-  
13 aster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42 U.S.C.  
14 5121 et seq.).

15 (b) REQUIREMENT.—Any face masks, surgical  
16 masks, and N-95 respirator masks procured or manufac-  
17 tured for purposes of carrying out this Act shall be pur-  
18 chased in accordance with Federal Acquisition Regulation  
19 guidance on fair and reasonable pricing.

20 (c) EXCESS MASKS.—Any face masks, surgical  
21 masks, and N-95 respirator masks in the possession of  
22 the Federal Emergency Management Agency or the De-  
23 partment of Health and Human Services for purposes of  
24 carrying out this Act that have not been distributed as



1 of the date described in section 6(d) shall be added to the  
2 strategic national stockpile.

3 **SEC. 6. APPROPRIATION; LIMITATIONS.**

4 (a) APPROPRIATION.—There is appropriated, out of  
5 amounts in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,  
6 \$5,000,000,000, to remain available until the date de-  
7 scribed in subsection (d), to the Administrator to carry  
8 out this Act, provided that the Administrator uses such  
9 amounts as are necessary to reimburse the United States  
10 Postal Service for the delivery of masks under this Act.

11 (b) LIMITATION.—No funds made available under  
12 this section shall be provided to—

13 (1) any person who is a Federal elected official  
14 or serving in a Senior Executive Service position; or

15 (2) any entity that is controlled in whole or in  
16 part by a Federal elected official or serving in a  
17 Senior Executive Service position.

18 (c) EMERGENCY DESIGNATION.—

19 (1) IN GENERAL.—The amounts provided under  
20 this section are designated as an emergency require-  
21 ment pursuant to section 4(g) of the Statutory Pay-  
22 As-You-Go Act of 2010 (2 U.S.C. 933(g)).

23 (2) DESIGNATION IN SENATE.—In the Senate,  
24 this section is designated as an emergency require-  
25 ment pursuant to section 4112(a) of H. Con. Res.

1           71 (115th Congress), the concurrent resolution on  
2           the budget for fiscal year 2018.

3           (d) DATE DESCRIBED.—The date described in this  
4           subsection is the date on which no new cases of COVID–  
5           19 are reported in the United States for a period of not  
6           less than 14 consecutive days.

7           **SEC. 7. REPORTS TO CONGRESS.**

8           (a) SUBMISSION OF PLAN.—Not later than 14 days  
9           after the date of enactment of this Act, the Administrator  
10          shall submit to Congress a strategic plan to, as soon as  
11          practicable, eliminate all shortages of face masks, surgical  
12          masks, and N-95 respirator masks, increase domestic pro-  
13          duction of masks, distribute masks to the general public  
14          and the health care workforce, and fulfill all other require-  
15          ments of this Act.

16          (b) WEEKLY PROGRESS REPORTS.—Beginning 7  
17          days after the date of on which the strategic plan is sub-  
18          mitted under subsection (a), and every 7 days thereafter  
19          until the requirements of this Act are met, the Adminis-  
20          trator shall submit to Congress a detailed report on the  
21          activities undertaken to fulfill the requirements of this Act  
22          and a timeline for when such requirements will be fulfilled,  
23          which shall include—

24                   (1) information on—

1 (A) the use of funds under this Act, pro-  
2 vided in an itemized list;

3 (B) the current and projected supply of  
4 face masks, surgical masks, and N-95 res-  
5 pirator masks;

6 (C) the sources of face masks, surgical  
7 masks, and N-95 respirator masks;

8 (D) the distribution of face masks, surgical  
9 masks, and N-95 respirator masks, by State,  
10 geographic area, and need;

11 (E) the prices paid by the Federal Govern-  
12 ment and to which suppliers such amounts were  
13 paid; and

14 (2) any other information requested by Con-  
15 gress.

16 (c) INSPECTOR GENERAL OVERSIGHT.—

17 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Inspector General of  
18 the Department of Homeland Security shall conduct  
19 monitoring and oversight of the receipt, disburse-  
20 ment, and use of funds made available under this  
21 Act.

22 (2) REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after the  
23 date described in section 6(d), the Inspector General  
24 of the Department of Homeland Security shall con-  
25 duct an audit of the program established under this

1 Act and submit to Congress a report on the findings  
2 of such audit.

3 **SEC. 8. DEFINITIONS.**

4 In this Act:

5 (1) ADMINISTRATOR.—The term “Adminis-  
6 trator” means the Administrator of the Federal  
7 Emergency Management Agency.

8 (2) ASSISTANT SECRETARY.—The term “Assist-  
9 ant Secretary” means the Assistant Secretary for  
10 Preparedness and Response of the Department of  
11 Health and Human Services.

12 (3) INDIAN TRIBE.—The term “Indian Tribe”  
13 has the meaning given the term “Indian tribe” in  
14 section 4(e) of the Indian Self-Determination and  
15 Education Assistance Act (25 U.S.C. 5304(e)).

16 (4) SECRETARY.—The term “Secretary” means  
17 the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

18 (5) SENIOR EXECUTIVE SERVICE POSITION.—  
19 The term “Senior Executive Service position” has  
20 the meaning given that term in section 3132(a) of  
21 title 5, United States Code.

22 (6) STATE.—The term “State” means—

23 (A) any State of the United States;

24 (B) the District of Columbia;

25 (C) the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico;

- 1 (D) Guam;
- 2 (E) American Samoa;
- 3 (F) the Commonwealth of the Northern
- 4 Mariana Islands;
- 5 (G) the Federated States of Micronesia;
- 6 (H) the Republic of the Marshall Islands;
- 7 (I) the Republic of Palau;
- 8 (J) the United States Virgin Islands; and
- 9 (K) each Indian Tribe.

10 (7) UNITED STATES.—The term “United  
11 States” means—

- 12 (A) each of the several States of the
- 13 United States;
- 14 (B) the District of Columbia;
- 15 (C) the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico;
- 16 (D) Guam;
- 17 (E) American Samoa;
- 18 (F) the Commonwealth of the Northern
- 19 Mariana Islands;
- 20 (G) the Federated States of Micronesia;
- 21 (H) the Republic of the Marshall Islands;
- 22 (I) the Republic of Palau;
- 23 (J) the United States Virgin Islands; and
- 24 (K) each Indian Tribe.
